Gleanings from periodicals: Kathleen Nott reviewed #Zaka and Tradition by Kathleen Baine In the Aug. 17, 1969 issue of the Observer ("Symbols and Sources," p. 21). In the Gazndian for June 27, 1968, there is a news lifem and photograph with the caption "Nomage to William Blake" (p. 6). The subject is the unvoiling of a memorial relief sculpture of Blake--a triptych measuring 15 ft, by 9 ft.--at William Blake House, Marshall Street, London, W. I. The sculptor is John W. Mills; two panels are in cast aluminum, one in bronze; the head is based on the life mask in the National Portrait Gallery.

The August 1969 number of Art and Artists magazine is devoted to "Art and Revolution"; if includes "William Blake: Revolutionary or Rebel?" by John Christopher Battys (pp. 24-25).
